Change needed & what we did



Why?

Feedback that people were not having their information and communication needs metleading to loss of independence, privacy, dignity, having to rely on others and potentially not having health needs met

What?

Co produced engagement – design and delivery

Asked 118 people in Focus groups:

Have you heard about the AIS What works well What doesn't work What could be done better

Wrote up the findings and presented to ICB





Impact





- System Group established led by ICB, representing all providers, working together to share good practice, drive improvements, increase consistency on an ongoing basis with Healthwatch round the table
- Our recommendations form the action plan
- Providers carried out AIS Self Assessment (one of 2 national pilots) identifying gaps in adherence to the standard at local level, resulting in immediate improvements and agreement of system wide priorities e.g.: IT systems to better record, flag and share; staff staff training; awareness raising about rights and resources
